Yet that is the very word used in the Bible, of Christians: disciples!

That's why we're handing out the Bibles in church again - to remind ourselves to focus on God's word. That's why we've started a new page on our website, "This Week's Learning". Take a look - it's all about discipleship.

Experiments in Prayer



Trinity Kids

Trinity Kids meets for three out of four weeks every month and is for all children of primary school age. We have Sparklers for kids aged 3 to Reception Class at school, All Stars for years 1-3 at school and Trailblazers for years 4-6 at school.

The teaching team has 22 staff and we have 96 children registered, averaging 30 children each week. Each Christmas the children prepare and present a nativity play. In the summer we organise a trip to the seaside.

We meet in the new drama block at St Martin's school which is modern and cosy. We teach from Scripture Union 'Salt and Light' teaching books. All the age groups are learning the same subjects but in different ways. At the end of the session each child has a leaflet to take home and the Sparklers usually come out laden with handicrafts too.

It's a real honour to teach our Christian faith to these young people and we appreciate parents and guardians bringing their children or allowing them to come alone if they are old enough.

It's an eye opener to hear the joys and challenges of being a Christian child at primary school or on a local estate and we grapple with questions that challenge adults like 'How can you think Judas is in heaven when he committed suicide?'

I think each team member would agree this is one of the most worthwhile things we do all week and we can always feel the whole church praying for us.

Free From Debt!

The ministry of Christians Against Poverty has been a vital part of Holy Trinity for over seven years. It offers free debt counselling in people's homes from an award winning Christian charity. Besides helping people to manage their finances effectively and overcome debt, we also offer people a chance to engage in their local community and find Jesus in their lives.

The role as centre manager is a real privilege to me because every week our dedicated volunteer team and I meet new people and learn their stories.

Many face the same problems: cycles of abusive relationships, singleparent households, exploitative work conditions, benefit sanctions, lack of employment opportunities for teenagers and young adults, shortage of adequate housing. Often people feel overwhelmed and entirely exhausted by their problems – most clients feel emotional on visits and are grateful that CAP takes time to listen and pray with people.

Through this ministry we help people find structure and guidance in their lives – financially as well as spiritually. When clients are strong enough to accept change as a challenge, this pattern can also stimulate positive change in other areas of their lives. But, not everybody is ready and often people hang on to their old routines because they have experienced too much insecurity, which ruined their ability to break out of a passive role.

CAP is about giving people hope, showing them a way and empowering them. It provides real practical help to problems our parish is faced with. It is a wonderful ministry and above all it carries Jesus name.

Holy Trinity is blessed with a fantastic number of gifted musicians and sound guys, but what really makes a difference is the sense of vision and teamwork. Every time someone leads, they have a clear idea of what we're aiming for; when someone else is leading, we're all there to support and serve.

Sadly, longstanding drummer, Len "Ringo" Villa has retired due to health, but we've welcomed a number of new regulars to the team this year: Anna & Sam on vocals, Big Dave on piano and organ, Ifi was with us making a huge impact on drums, Stuart returned to fill out the bass and began as a leader, Bethany joined husband Peter, on Cello in the evenings services.

We've also been bringing on new young talent: Ayo, Dami and Ope on drums, Steph on bass, and Jess on flute - all from our youth church.

We continue to write our own songs. One of our songwriters, Roly, reflects on where the inspiration comes from:

"I teach in a special needs school. Recently, I arranged for a Christian drama group to come in and do an Easter play for the students. One of the autistic kids I teach doesn't say anything except 'Mum'. He's clever and uses an iPhone with speech software to talk but at the end of the play, he came running up to me with his arms in the air saying 'Alive! Alive!'


Most of the time, my language is pretty ordinary. But sometimes, as with my student friend, something a bit special arises from the depths. Where does inspiration come from?

Put simply, God has made us all to be creative. A volcano erupts when the depths of the earth below it heave and boil. The boy at school was so moved that he used his voice rather than his iPhone.

Sometimes, if we allow it to, truth can move us in such a way that we express it in new language. Beauty gives birth to beauty. God wants us to take the credit and responsibility for that - we are participants with him."

Balancing the Books!



These are our other four major funds based on the figures at the end of March 2015. We also have a Youth Project Fund of $\pounds 3,475$.

A full set of accounts can be found at the back of the church.

Our financial situation continues to be a bit of a tightrope but we give thanks to God for helping us to balance the books this year after last year's $\pm 12,000$ deficit. We have been able to do this because of three things:

- i) We were able to renegotiate our contribution to the diocese down by around £9,100 for 2014 and £9,500 in 2015.
- Susi's new ministry as Chaplain of St Martin's School has brought us in a new income stream. In 2014 it was worth £1,590, and in 2015 it will be worth £5,400. However, this source will dry up when Susi moves next Summer. Please pray for Susi in this ministry - it can be extremely demanding and he often has to give more than his contracted 1 day per week.
- iii) Some church members have either increased their giving, or have set up new standing orders. Two or three, in recognition of the serious situation we were in, transferred their giving from our Straw Bale Hub into our general fund.

In the future we might have an income from our new Neighbourhood Hub, but this could still be quite a way off - especially if we end up having to take out a loan to complete the building of it.

The bottom line message, therefore, is: *please keep on prayerfully reviewing and increasing your giving so that we can fulfill our ministry and build a much-needed financial safety net.*

Ten years ago a project was born, "To live out the word of God in our local community, working co-operatively and responding to local needs." It was named **Imagine!** Over the years we have followed various paths, some coming to a dead end and others developing in ways we had not expected. We have had generous funding, no funding, lots of helpers, not so many helpers. But we have always tried to be true the vision of being a blessing to those involved, being a support and a prayer resource.

Our current work focuses on families, children, some local schools and developing partnerships with local groups.

Trinity Tots is increasingly increasingly popular, running two mornings per week and finishing this term with an Easter egg hunt.

The **Homework Club** has had some great outings including Kensington Palace and Morden Hall Park. The children made a banner for the church Prayer Space and one for Richard on completing his marathon! We are grateful to Amicus/Horizon for continuing to fund this. Jacky sits on their area panel.

Our links to the local schools continue, highlighted by classes coming to church to take part in **"Easter Experience"**. This was an opportunity for them, to move in groups around different Easter Installations, from Palm Sunday through the Last Supper, Gethsemane, and the cross to Easter Day, and reflect on what each part of the story felt like and meant. We also ran our "best yet" **Half-Term Holiday Club**, for which Girls from St Martin's School volunteered as helpers. We hope to build on this connection.

The demand for help from victims of **Domestic Violence** grows every year, a sad indication of how prevalent this is. We supply food, vouchers, baby clothing, via ACTS 435. There is the prospect of more direct contact with the clients in the near future.

Our work with the Tulse Hill Forum has included organising a workshop for parents on anti bullying techniques so they can help their children, as well as "Tulse Hill Together", a celebration of all things Tulse Hill, where groups could bid for small grants for local projects. The most recent project involves neighborhood planning, something which will involve all of us. Do look out for more information soon.

We have developed a good relationship with the Community Development Worker on Roupell Park Estate and hope to work on joint projects there.

As usual we give huge thanks to our Volunteers. As we imagine God's Kingdom we see a world in which people are free, healed, released, and joyful - here in Tulse Hill!

- 23 baptisms have taken place, including 4 adults. This is up on the previous 3 years.
- There were no confirmations, but we expect several in 2015.
- 2 weddings have been held a downward trend reflecting the rise in fees.

October 18th saw our first Restart Party. Restart brings together local people with volunteer repairers to work on a range of broken electronics. By helping people fix their own gadgets everyone benefits - and it's good for the environment.

The organisation behind Restart Parties is the Restart Project. It has prevented over a ton of electronics being thrown away, and was set up by Janet Gunter and Ugo Vallauri in 2012.

"We aim to radically improve our relationship to electronics. We need to fully own our gadgets, like we would our cars or bicycles. Would you throw those away and upgrade the moment you had a problem?" says Ugo.

About twenty people came along with radios, computers, phones, hoovers, and even an electronic toothbrush in need of a little TLC! Although not all items were brought back into use everyone enjoyed the community atmosphere and the chance to see inside their electronics and demystify what lies under the case.

So does the PCC **Constant** do anything ?

The PCC (Parish Church Council) are responsible for overseeing all aspects of church fellowship, building and finances, as well as supporting and encouraging our leadership team. Most of what you read about in this report has been overseen by the PCC.

Some Highlights

We've continued to develop our Mission Action Plan (MAP) for our parish, identifying our local mission priorities for the next 3 years. At the same time we have continued to support our mission partners further afield in the UK, France, Ghana, Tunisia and Latin America; and during 2014 it was a great having mission partners to visit us at Holy Trinity.

We reviewed plans for our 2014 Weekend at Home & participation in the Lambeth Country Show, and have begun planning for the Parish Mission Weekend. We regularly reflect on main festival services and feedback to the leadership.

Richard shared ideas with the PCC for the Tulse Hill Peace Walk and Gathering on for WW1 remembrance.

Some Challenges

Our church finances have had a tough few years, and during the past year the PCC has been monitoring them very closely. At one point our

general fund became very close to being empty. Most groups in our church are very careful with their spend, but the PCC had no choice but to begin drawing up plans for cutbacks. Then at the 11th hour our finances turned around.

Staff Changes

For many years we have been blessed with a great staff and leadership team. This year was no exception: Gloria was licensed as a Reader; Susi's ministry continues to widen with his appointment as chaplain to St Martins School; and Richard is now Assistant Area Dean – whilst continuing as our vicar.

New Ideas

Holy Trinity is always a place for new ideas. Many of these come to the PCC for discussion and support. We hope that you've benefited from some of those ideas over the past year. Thank you to everyone that has been involved with running all our groups and activities.

A huge thank you to all who have served on PCC this year, for your contributions, and especially to those members whose term ends this year - particularly Lorraine Reimmer-Okonkwo who has been our assistant secretary.

In December we did "flashmob style" carol singing once again at Sainsburys which was greatly appreciated.




The Men's and Women's Breakfasts each attended by 35-40 people - great food, great speakers, great service.
