

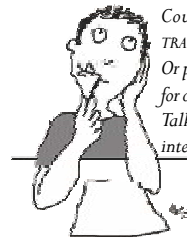

Through activities such as cooking, dancing, film-making, games and crafts the children were able to explore bible stories in new ways. Then, in small groups they were able to talk about their own lives and journeys of faith.



One of the biggest highlights was the igloo we built out of milk bottles. Around 1,000 were collected by church members, school parents, and local neighbours.

The children loved going into this Sacred Space, where Joy led them in personal prayers. The responses were breath taking.

Irene liked the book-sharing, where everybody brings a book, reads a bit and says why they like it. Vernon said it's a nice, friendly place to come.

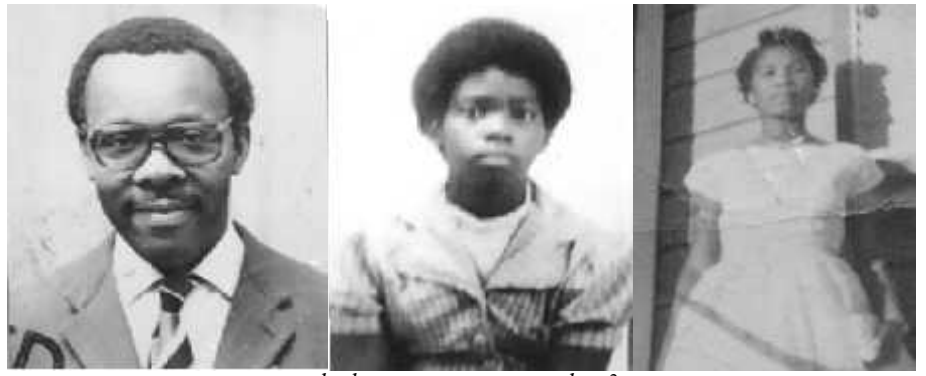
Trinity Social Club meets every Monday from 12-3pm. Lunch: £2.50. Tea and snacks only: £1.

Last year we were 10 years old - so this year, here are 11 highlights!

- Trinity Tots Parents/Carers & Toddlers' group: A Fab Fun Day in September. with sunshine, bouncy castle, face painting, music and food, meeting up with past and present parents.
- School Club on The Fields Estate: Children love it! Don't want to leave! So another weekly session over summer for 11-14s
- Gaia, Domestic Violence Centre: We most recently worked with one of their children's workers to arrange Christmas and Easter parties for families, including those in Refuges.
- ACTS 435/Food Bank vouchers: Providing food and financial support for anyone in need. This year we note an increased use of both
- Tulsa Hill Forum: Community work with this group is very satisfying and we are now accepted as a big part of what goes on locally, to the extent of receiving funds for 2 church events this past year.
- Amicus/Horizon Housing Association: They generously fund activities, including events, for homework club and a craft workshop for International Women's day.
- Credit Union: We worked with the Centre for Theology to promote the work of the CU and sign up more members in school and church.
- Senior Schools: St Martin's girls helped us put on a Christmas lunch for local isolated people. We hope to involve them in the Neighbourhood Plan. Seven girls also volunteered at our half-term holiday club, "Polar Explorers".
- Festivals on estates: Roupell Estate has a annual Fun Day and we were had a stall last year. This year we plan to get the children in the Homework club involved.
- Carol Singing on the Fields Estate: It's great to gather local residents to join in festive singing outside our Community Flat.
- Support: perhaps this most important area covers all of the above. The general support we offer whilst involved in all the other activities is often the most valued. Because of the nature of the work, we met many who need support and encouragement. And we hope we can show God's love in this, by sharing our story and listening to the stories of others.

There have been various incarnations of Imagine over the years, but always with the aim of being fully involved in our local community...being good neighbours.

My Ministry Outside Church



I have been at Holy Trinity since 2010 having moved from St Mathews' Brixton where I served my curacy. I regard my ministry here as a privilege and a joy. I am not paid by the Church - I am too expensive (lol!) - but my income is from secular employment. The Church of England has a range of titles for ministers in my position, so while it's still deciding, I will go with the title: "Honorary Assistant Priest."

Away from Holy Trinity, I have two part time jobs both relating to Healthcare Chaplaincy. First, I work two days a week as a hospital Chaplain in Guy's & St Thomas'. For the past 10 years, I have helped provide a pastoral and mission presence in the hospital. My role is to speak into the human condition, offering wholeness to patients, families and staff - helping people be not more religious, but more human.

The emotional and spiritual aspects of care are attended to by listening to concerns and worries, as well as sharing their reminiscences. It's about giving people opportunity to review their life history, explore their doubts and fears, and in some cases, enabling families to prepare for a loved one's death.

My other three working days of the week is looking after 700 Healthcare chaplains in UK belonging to a Professional Association- College of Healthcare Chaplains. It's a serving ministry of supporting hospital/hospice chaplains with work-related issues as a Union rep, giving pastoral support when needed, and building relationships with one another. I try to encourage the recognition that each has a role by bringing together vocational identity, personal narrative, and theology, to gain insight and understanding.

Like all of us in our different contexts, I aim to take the love of God out to people and enable them to experience that love.

'I remember my Sunday School like it was yesterday. I loved it'.

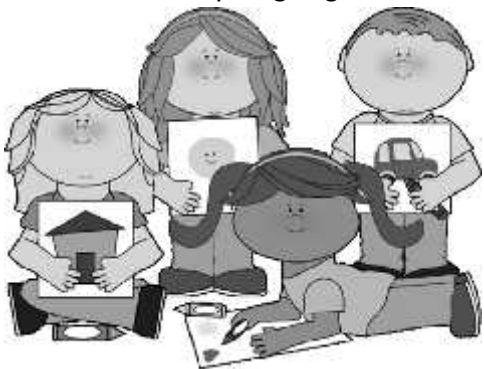
'These are great children. They are really into it'.

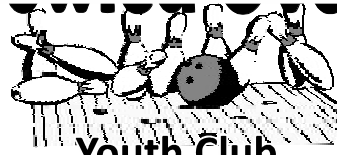
We pray that as each child develops and grows, the foundations will be laid for them to be people who know God, pray confidently, demonstrate their faith and are sure where they are going in life.

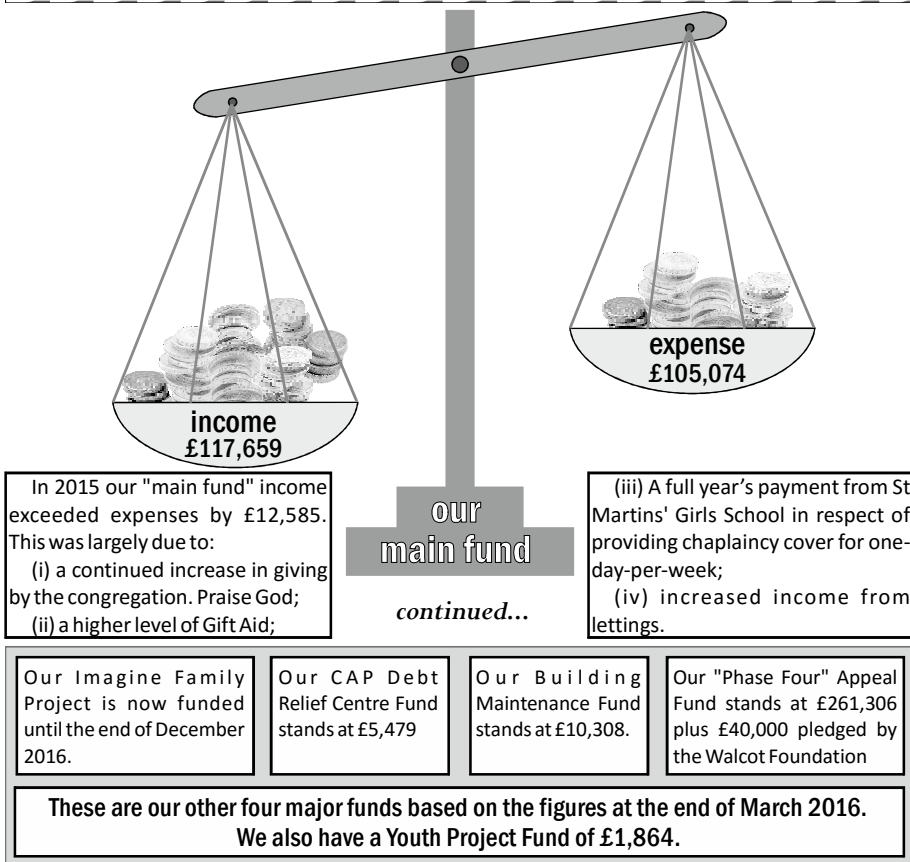

A Year Of Blessing



A full set of accounts for the year ending 31st December 2015 are at the back of church.

Our Main Fund financial situation continued its upward trend since the deficit of £12,000 in 2013. In 2014 income exceeded expenditure by £3,298 and in 2015 income exceeded expenditure by £12,585 for which we give thanks to God.

This is largely due to three elements:

- i) Significantly improved levels of giving by church members which in turn led to a higher level of Gift Aid Tax Refund.
- ii) Increased Income from lettings of the Undercroft and the main church auditorium.
- iii) Susi's new ministry as Chaplain of St Martin's School for one-day-per-week which commenced in September 2014 resulted in a new income stream. In 2014 it was worth £1,590, and in 2015 it was worth £5,400. However, as of April 2016 this has now ended.

In the future we might have an income from our new Neighbourhood Hub, but this could still be quite a way off - especially if we end up having to take out a loan to complete the building of it.

The bottom line message, therefore, is: please keep on prayerfully reviewing and increasing your giving so that we can continue to fulfil our ministry and build a much-needed financial safety net over a long period.

Deanery Synod

Although most people think of the church as either the building or the people within it, there is though of course the wider Church of England and the even wider Anglican Communion across the entire globe.

Joining parishes together we have Deanery Synod, at which each church has two or more representatives. (Joy Mantel and I are your Deanery Synod reps). This body, in turn, has reps to the Diocesan Synod, which again has reps to the national General Synod.

General Synod is sometimes in the news when controversial decisions need to be made by the church.

This link is of course only a small part of the business of our deanery synod's work. Much is concerned with matters local to our own South Lambeth Deanery. This comprises 15 churches in a rough triangle from St James' Clapham in the north, Christ Church Gypsy Hill in the south east and Holy Redeemer Church in Streatham vale to the South West).

Unfortunately I think I have used up my space and I haven't even told you that we meet about three times a year, always open our meeting with prayers, discuss issues relevant to the deanery and listen to a speaker.

Well that will need to wait until another time, or ask Joy Richard or me about what happens next time you see us.

Please keep your eyes open for the next dates and don't throw out your broken gizmos, you might be able to fix them with Restart's help.

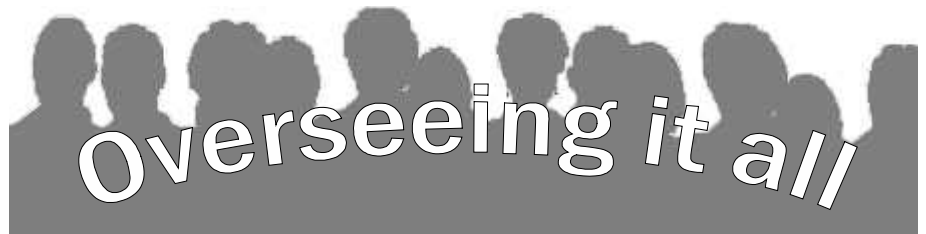

Kwik Stats...

Since our last Annual Meeting:

- 11 people (adults & children) joined our worshipping community, but 29 left - 19 of them moving away from the area.
- 7 baptisms have taken place (last 3 years: 14, 19, 11 - downward trend)
- 15 people were confirmed (last year: 0, 14 - steady trend)
- 4 weddings celebrated (last year: 4; about 8 planned for 2016)

That's pretty much the role of the PCC (Parish Church Council). We are responsible for overseeing all aspects of our church fellowship, building and finances, including supporting and encouraging our leadership team.

The PCC continues to monitor our church income and expenditure very closely (details on the finances are covered elsewhere in this report).

Some Highlights

We reviewed plans for our 2015 Parish Mission Weekend and began planning for our 2016 Weekend Away. We've had a look at our All-Age, Christmas and Easter services and given feedback to the leadership team. We've explored options to expand the Social Club.

We have had updates on our many links with our local schools - through the Imagine project, clergy links and also by hosting school events in our church. We hosted an Oxjam fund raising event by local musicians.

At the same time we've continued to support our mission partners further afield in the UK, France, Ghana, Tunisia and Latin America; and in October Bill & Hilary Musk retired after seven years in Tunisia.

The Diocese approached us to support the "B Line for London" - providing bee friendly plants for bee corridors across the city - something to include in the final stages of our straw-bale extension project - which of course, we have also been monitoring.

Staff Changes

It's been a year of goodbyes. In August our CAP Centre Manager Vanessa went on maternity leave - congratulations on the arrival of her second daughter.

In September Rowland (one of our Readers) started a year out doing missionary work in India with the United Society.

In March Susi's 3½ years' curacy with Holy Trinity came to an end, and the family have now moved to Portsmouth where Susi will be vicar of St Simon's, Southsea. We will miss you all.

Some Challenges

Our CAP Centre is currently closed - new clients are being referred to other nearby CAP Centres - we had hoped to keep our CAP Centre open this year, and looked into arranging maternity cover.

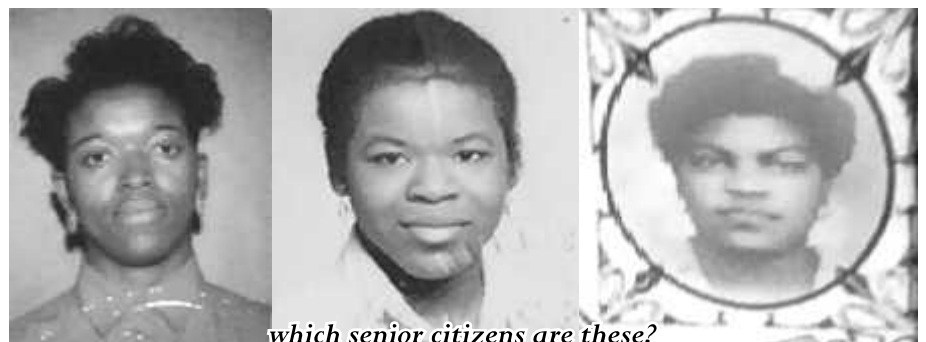
We have been considering options for a Youth Work leader, or other ministry support, but this has been inconclusive.

Over the time I have been a governor at Holy Trinity school there have been many changes both in the school: the building of the "newer" sections of the school, changes in staff, (recently Mr Black left to become the head of a school in Camberwell, well done to him on all he did for the school and his rising to leadership), and many pupils (about 700 I think). But possibly the biggest changes are coming in the way all schools are

Holy Trinity Church school is run with guidance and support from the Southwark Board of Education and Lambeth Local Authority but with recent announcements from the government this all might change!

I will avoid getting properly into the politics but safe to say I am not a fan of forcing schools to become academies against their will. But as you may know, the government's current aim is for all schools to be academies by 2020.



If you think you would like to help support and guide the school as these changes and difficult times in terms of funding there will shortly be another PCC nominated governor place available: after twelve years I feel it is time for me to move on.

It has been a great experience and I have learnt a lot, much of it applicable to many other situations. I have learnt more than anything that it takes a whole team to educate a child. It has been a pleasure to be a small part of that team and I would like to encourage you, if you have enthusiasm, time and a desire to see Holy Trinity School continue going from "Good* to Great" - please consider this opportunity to serve.
